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What is a Wiki?

- ❖ A wiki is a website designed for collaboration.
- ❖ In a wiki everyone can edit, update and add pages without having to know html language.
- ❖ Wikis can be either publicly accessible or privately secure.

How can a wiki be used in higher education?

Group authoring

- ❖ Often groups collaborate on a document by emailing a file that each person edits individually.
- ❖ Some attempt is made to coordinate the edits so all of the efforts are equally represented in the final document.
- ❖ Using a wiki brings the group members together to build and edit the document on a wiki page.
- ❖ This strengthens the community within the group and allows group members with similar ideas to collaboratively build on each other's work.
- ❖ It also allows all group members immediate, equal access to the most recent version of the document.
- ❖ Further, group members can take advantage of the automatic revision history that saves a version of the document each time they makes changes.



How can a wiki be used in higher education?

Track a group project

- ❖ A wiki is very useful for tracking and completing group projects.
- ❖ It allows group members to track their progress from anywhere with internet access.
- ❖ It helps them save time by seeing what others have already done.
- ❖ It then gives them a central place to collectively prepare the final product.



How can a wiki be used in higher education?

Create simple websites

- ❖ When students are asked to create websites for an assignment, they have to rely on someone in the group knowing how to make a website.
- ❖ The wiki eliminates this problem because it provides a ready to use site with a simple user interface plus the ability to easily add pages and simple navigation.
- ❖ This allows students to spend more time developing the content of the site, instead of trying to learn how to make one.
