

Self-help Safe Spaces for Women


During the 1960s and 70s the Birming-ham Women's Liberation movement (BWL) led to multiple do-it-yourself actions, including setting up creches, consciousness-raising groups, safe houses and pregnancy advice centres.

A local woman opened up her private house to BWL, used for group meetings, pregnancy testing, producing their Newsletter and providing a women's library, health advice, information, support and referral, including for victims of domestic violence.

Then in 1986 two nuns opened up their home as a drop-in centre for local women involved in prostitution and vulnerable to exploitation, founding Anawim in Balsall Heath, still supporting women today. Women's Aid have also provided vital services and safe spaces for over 40 years.

Planning futures

Despite it's sometimes fractured nature, women's community planning in Birmingham persists. Women are key players in broader community-led planning campaigns (such as the Tower Ballroom campaign and Friends of Edgbaston Reservoir) and many place-based. projects draw in women's voices, including women of colour (such as the Grand Union Arts Organisation, Bertz Associates' arts education projects, MAIA, the black-led collective using arts to re-imagine place, Civic Square who demonstrate neighbourhood-scale civic infrastructures and many other brilliant groups).
