A Circularity of Struggle

BfP Women's Group wanted women's experiences to be integrated into mainstream planning processes, but instead we see a circularity whereby the same issues are fought for again and again, with demands re-emerging in different parts of the city at different times. Ideas and struggles can be lost between generations as constant redevelopment and changing governments erase previous wins. This means that the historical thread of women's community planning is more of a circularity based on repetition, rather than a linearity marking progress: a sporadic and repetitive history shaped by erasure and forgetfulness – yet kept alive by women's determination, imagination and solidarity that continue to drive women's demands for a people-friendly city.
