

Using RADAR to share and distribute learning materials

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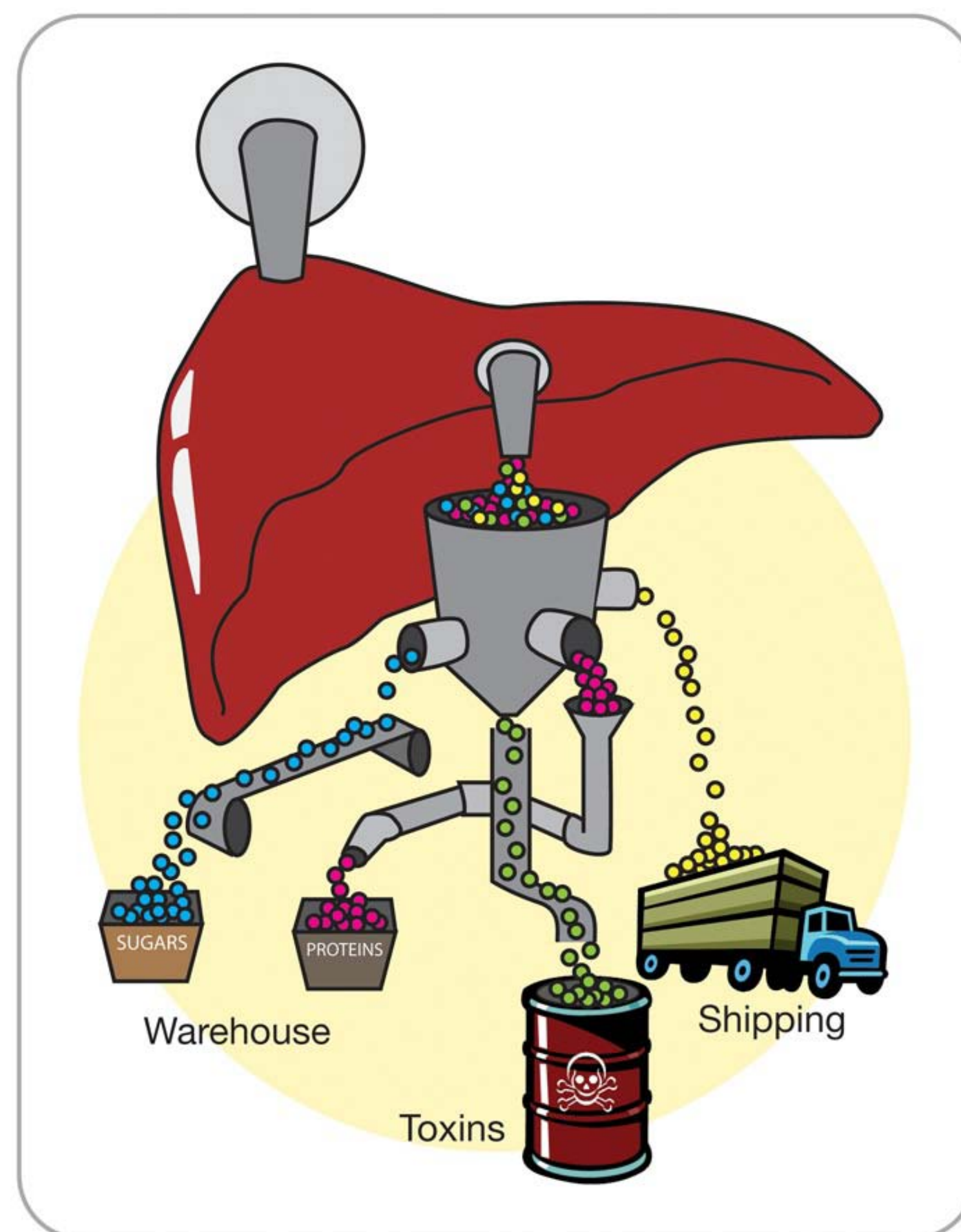
Sometimes you want a generic resource that can be used in multiple VLE courses, perhaps by different programmes. Up till now, you had to upload the item into each course.

With RADAR however, you upload the item once to RADAR and it is then available to any VLE course designer to use. In the example below we created a new resource and then linked to it from the VLE course.

Find the resource

We needed an image of the liver, but unfortunately the one we had was copyrighted. In this case, it was redrawn (and improved!) by Bob Pomfret in the Media Workshop.

Upload to RADAR

We uploaded the image to RADAR adding a description and other information.

Description
This is an illustration of the liver in order to demonstrate the process of metabolism of drugs within the liver. This has been used to introduce the principles of pharmacology (pharmacokinetics) to health care students (nurses, podiatrists, physiotherapists & radiographers).

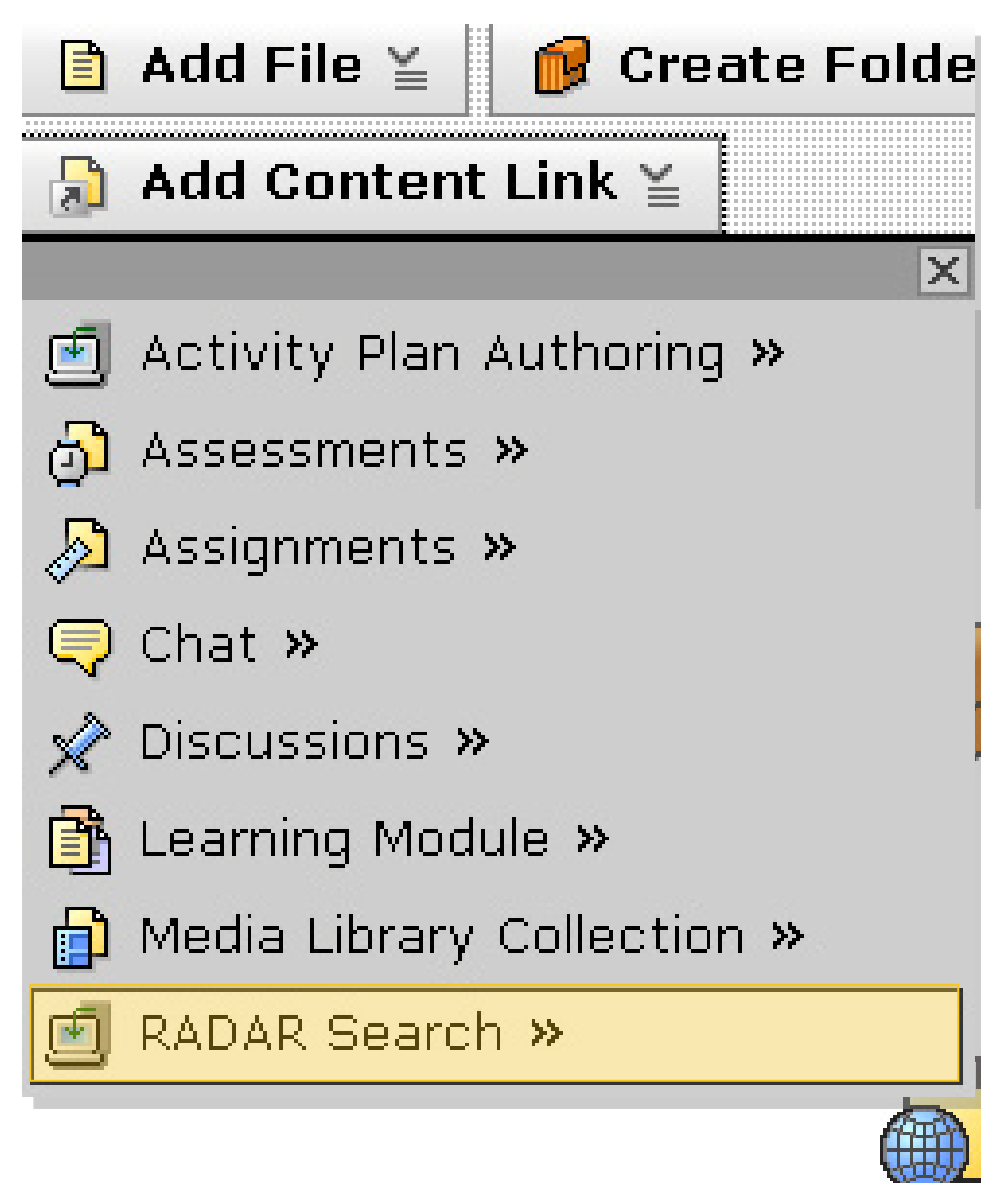
