

RICHARD HOGGART

Born in 1918, Richard Hoggart was educated at elementary and secondary schools in Leeds and at Leeds University. He has taught at the Universities of Hull and Leicester, and was visiting Professor at the University of Rochester (New York) from 1956-7. He is now Professor of English at the University of Birmingham, a post he has held since 1962. In 1964 he became Director of the Centre for Contemporary Cultural Studies.

He has been, at various times, on the Albermarle Committee on Youth Services, the British Council British Books Overseas Committee, the BBC General Advisory Council and the Youth Service Development Council. He was also a member of the Pilkington Committee on Broadcasting. He is a Governor of the Royal Shakespeare Theatre and the Birmingham Repertory Theatre and was a Fellow of the Royal Society of Literature from 1957 to 1963. His books include The Uses of Literacy (1957), W.H. Auden (1957), Teaching Literature (1963), The Critical Movement (1964) and The World in 1984 (1965), and a new one Speaking to Each Other is due early in 1970. Professor Hoggart is also the author of numerous articles, pamphlets and reviews.

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
