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Sustain-Opoly

The objective is to become the player with the most properties so that you are able to house vulnerable people in by buying, renting and selling property whilst playing. You can buy properties from the bank

Each Player starts with \$1500

- 2 x \$500
- 1 x \$100
- 1 x \$50
- 6 x \$20
- You store your money in your coloured section in the players bank.

Instead of rolling a dice, a question will be asked - you answer will identify how many squares you move. Everyone moves after every question.

BUYING - If you land on an unowned property you may buy the property from the bank at the designated price. Once you have purchased a property you can charge rent.

You can also choose to improve your property by insulating it or installing PV panels - if you have made improvements you can charge additional rent

If you hold the title deed of a colour group you are able to charge double rent.

RENTING - if you land on a property owned by someone else, you must pay them the rental price of the property.

MYSTERY/ COMMUNITY CHEST - If you land on a Mystery or Community Chest square you alone will have an additional question/price.

If you draw a get out of jail free card you may keep it to use when you need it or sell it at a price you set.

JAIL - If you land on the Go to Jail square you must move to jail immediately and not collect \$200. You can stay here for 3 questions or donate \$200 to a Climate Change charity to get out.

3. How often do you eat meat?
 - Never (5 points) (extra point if you are male)

 - Pepperoni Pizza without cheese (2 points)

How often do you eat out?

- Rarely (5)

Food bought in restaurants has a wider footprint than food you buy to cook at home because of the 'overheads' in the restaurants – the emissions associated with heating, lighting and cooking for your meal. Food from takeaways has additional packaging and additional transport emissions, from the means of getting it from the restaurant to your home.

How much of the food you buy gets thrown away?

One third of all food produced is wasted. Every year wasted food in the UK represents 14 million tonnes of carbon dioxide emissions. In total, these greenhouse gas emissions are the same as those created by 7 million cars each year.

Buying local and seasonal food will generally result in a lower footprint. It depends how it's produced and packaged, but it is more likely to have a lower environmental footprint. Not that buying from abroad is necessarily a bad thing. Food grown in a sustainable way and traded fairly can be vital for developing countries. Buy thoughtfully...

By turning down your central heating thermostat by just 1°C you could reduce the energy you use for heating by 10%. The same principle applies to air conditioning when it's hot - the less you use it (a warmer home in summer), the more you save (in money and carbon).

Move forward a square for each that applies to you. What do you recycle?

About a third of our kitchen and garden waste can be composted and, increasingly, local authorities collect compostable waste which they can process to produce renewable energy. By contrast, if it's dumped in landfill it turns into methane, which is a big contributor to climate change. The processes for dealing with waste — including landfill and incineration — are very energy-intensive

Community Chest/Mystery Cards

- Do Veganuary - Collect \$50 from the bank
- Switch to a green utility provider - Collect \$150
- You remember to take your reusable shopping bag to the shops - Collect \$100
- You get confused about what can and cannot be recycled and end up putting cling film in the recycling - pay the bank \$50
- You have some Electrical waste to dispose of at the tip but it's raining so you put it in your landfill waste bin instead - pay the bank \$100
- You replace your gas boiler with an electric boiler - pay the bank \$100 but collect an extra \$100 when you next pass Go
- Get out of jail free card
- You switch from a gas boiler to an electric boiler - collect \$50 from the bank
- You leave the house and forget to turn off all of lights and appliances - donate \$100 to a climate change charity
- When booking flights for your summer holiday you decide to double check which companies offset their carbon and decide to book with a greener company - collect \$50 from the bank
- Get out of jail free You accidentally fill up your car with diesel - pay the bank \$50
- Get out of jail free card
- You take a reusable mug into Costa but end up using a disposable cup to look more cool - pay the bank \$100
- Your flatmate put a plastic bottle in general waste, you got it out and put it in recycling - Collect \$200 from the bank
- Well done, you donate \$200 to a climate change charity - give \$200 to a climate change charity
- Treat yourself, you decided to buy a new electric car - pay the bank \$500
- You decide to buy a real Christmas tree instead of a plastic one - collect \$50 from the bank
- How much is does an electric car cost? £10k minimum (if you guessed between 10 and 20 collect \$20 from the bank)
- You go to a coffee shop but they are charging extra for milk alternatives so you decide to just go for cow's milk - pay the climate change company \$30
- You go out for dinner but there is only one vegan option available on the menu, although there isn't much choice you go for that one anyway - collect \$50 from the bank
- Your phone contract is renewing so you can upgrade, your phone still works fine, and you decide to go for a sim only contract and save yourself a bit of money as well - collect \$100 from the bank.
- It's your birthday and you are going out for a fancy meal and drinks with your friends, you decide to re-wear an outfit in your wardrobe instead of buying a new one - collect \$50 from the bank
